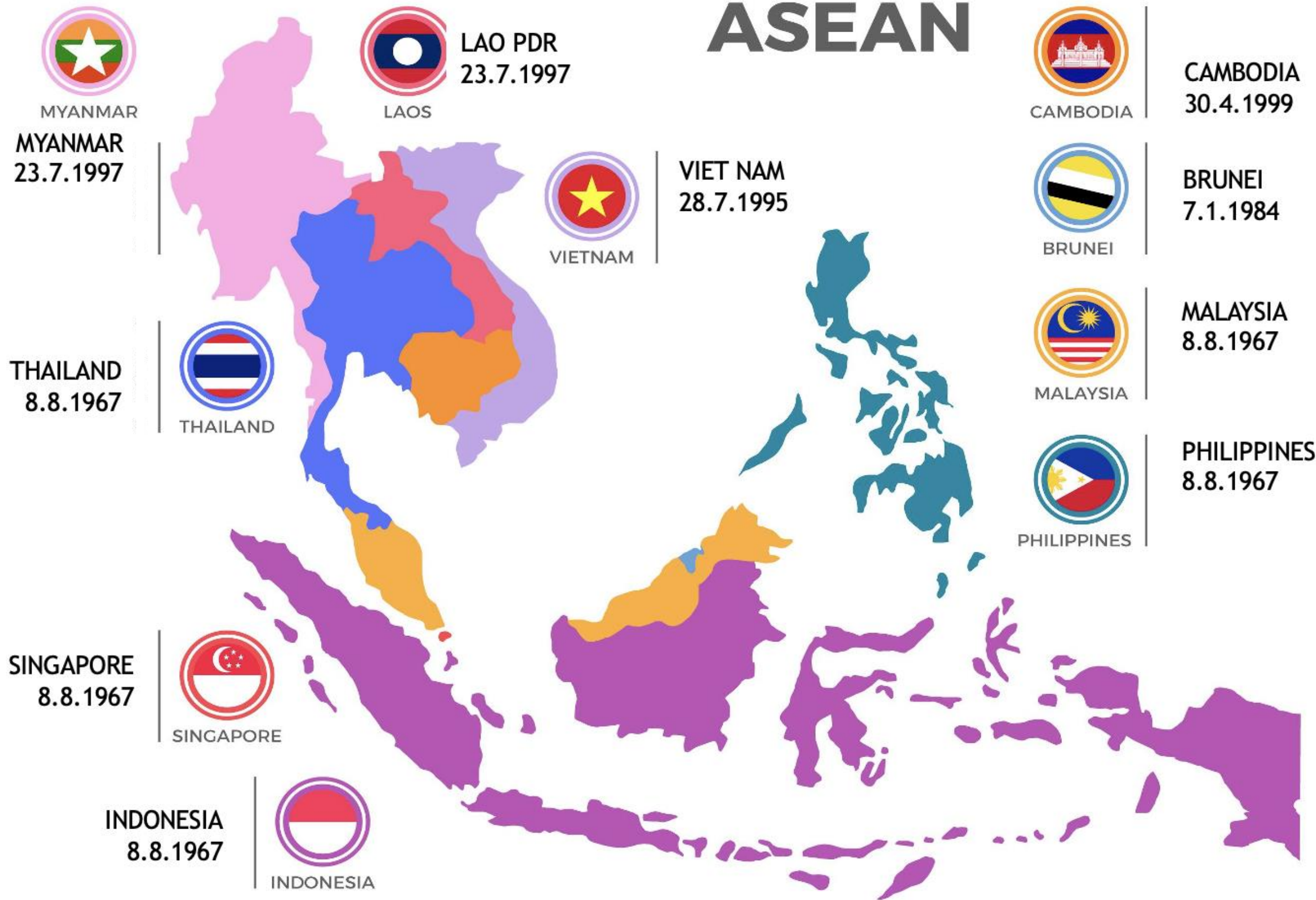

The ASEAN Region provides the immediate platform to tap into the Global Value Chain

Huge economic; business potentials within the 10 ASEAN Member Countries

Timor-Leste is set to be a Member State of ASEAN soon



- The total GDP of ASEAN reached US\$3.6 trillion in 2022,
- positioning it as the fifth largest economy in the world (Malaysia US\$445 billion est. 2024; IMF)
- trailing behind the United States (\$25.5 trillion), China (US\$ 17.9 trillion), Japan (US\$ 4.2 trillion), and Germany (US\$ 4.1 trillion).
- Has a combined population of 672 million,
- and in the decade up to 2022, its economy grew by annual growth rate of 4.2%



NAVIGATING THE ACPE REGISTRATION PROCESS

1. The driver behind the ACPE Registration

- The ASEAN Leaders resolve and commitment to establish and accelerate the establishment of an **ASEAN Community**,

One Economic Zone under
ASEAN without barriers

- The ASEAN Community is supported by three pillars
 - [ASEAN Political-Security Community](#), [ASEAN Economic Community](#) and [ASEAN Socio-Cultural Community](#).
 - Each pillar has its own Blueprint, and, together with the [Initiative for ASEAN Integration \(IAI\) Strategic Framework and IAI Work Plan Phase II \(2009-2015\)](#),
 - they form the [Roadmap for an ASEAN Community 2009-2015](#).

- [ASEAN Professional Mobility](#) is driven by the vision of ASEAN Leaders and ASEAN Member Countries as being [an integral part of the ASEAN Economic Community Pillar](#)

NAVIGATING THE ACPE REGISTRATION PROCESS

2. The Primary Instrument for ASEAN Professional Mobility – ASEAN Mutual Recognition Arrangement (the MRA)

What:

Important initiative in ASEAN integration on trade in services

Facilitate trade in services by **mutual recognition of authorization, licensing, or certification of professional service suppliers.**

Goal of the MRA is to **facilitate the flow of foreign professionals** taking into account relevant domestic regulations and market demand conditions.

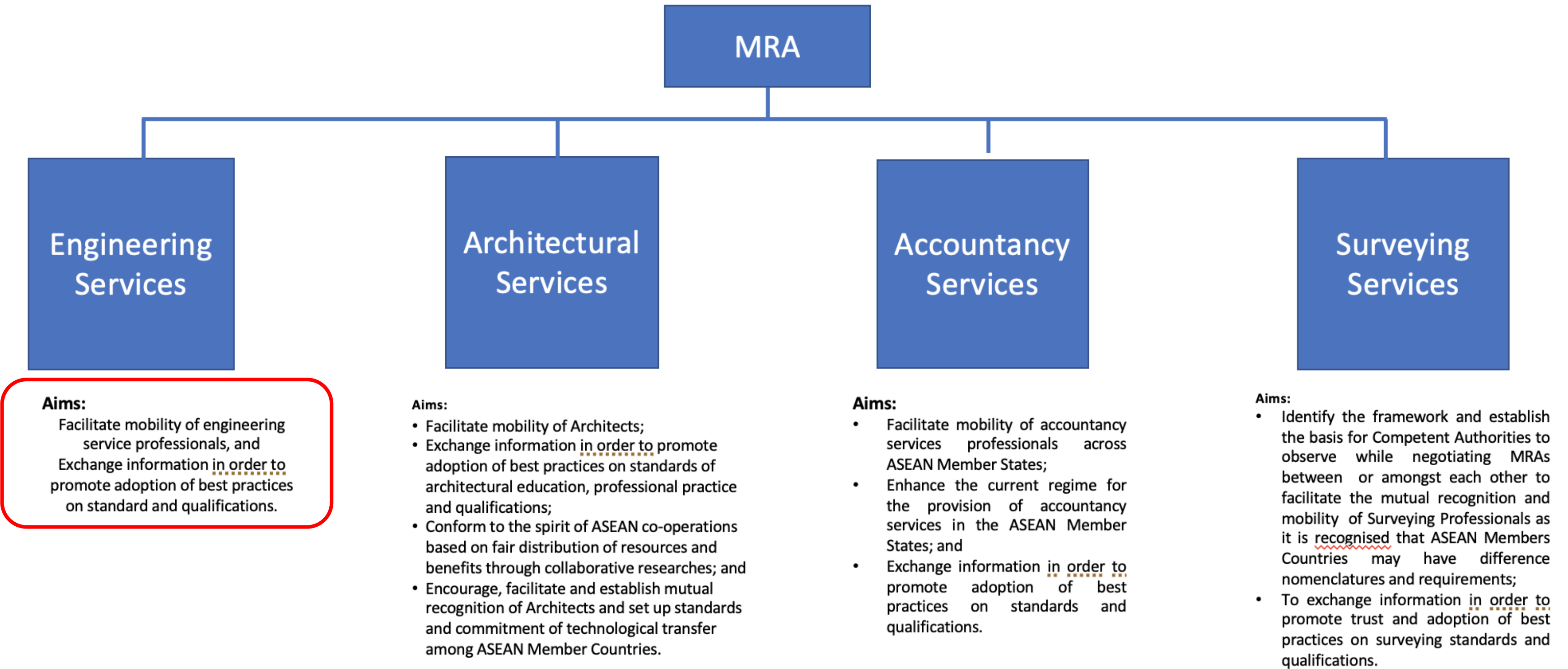
How:

- These MRAs enable the professional services suppliers certified or registered by the relevant authorities in their home country **to be mutually recognized by other signatory Member States**
- They are currently in various stages of implementation and follow-up initiatives, with **mechanisms being established to administer the implementation of the MRAs.**

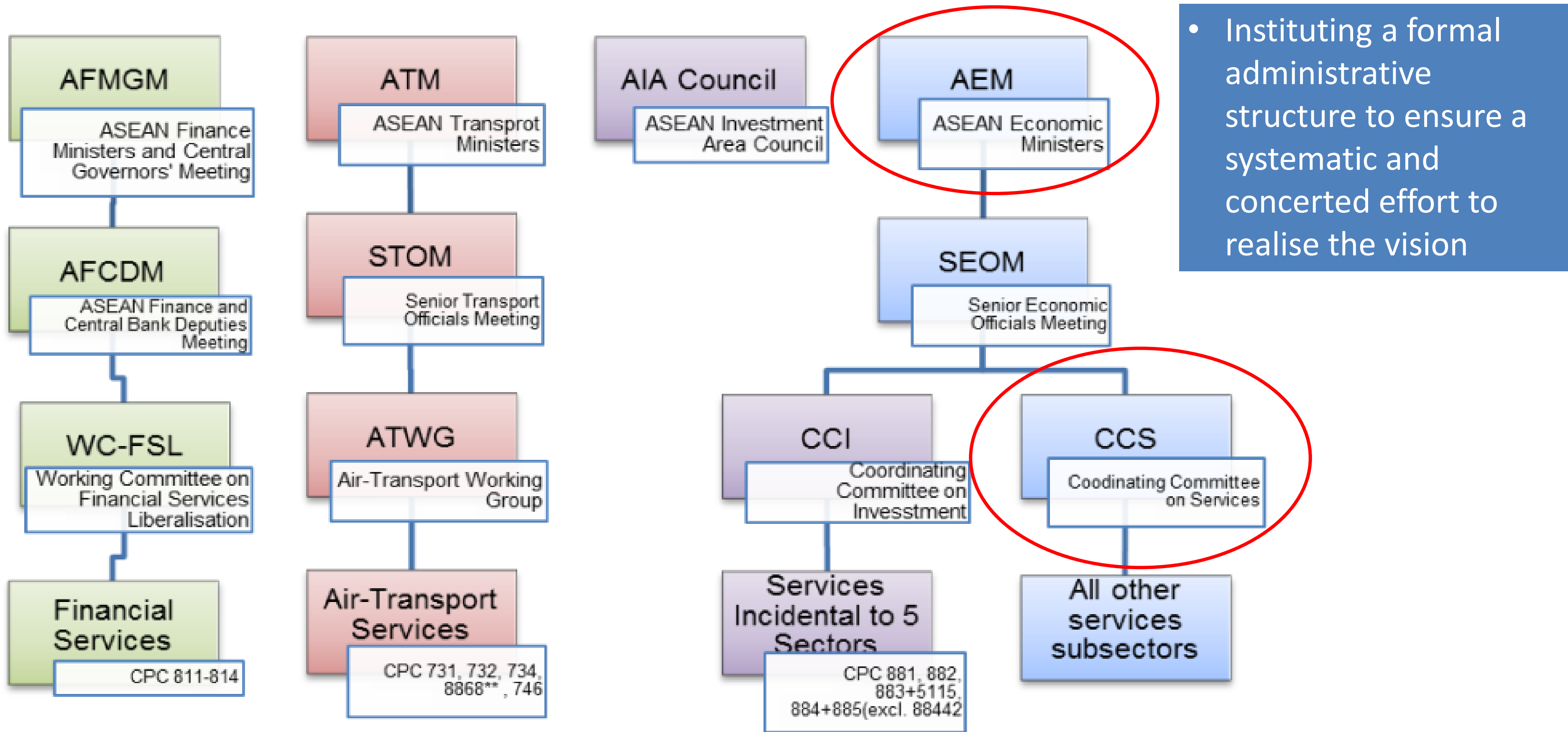
- The MRA essentially recognises that “a qualified professional recognised in a Member State is also recognised an ALL other ASEAN Member States”

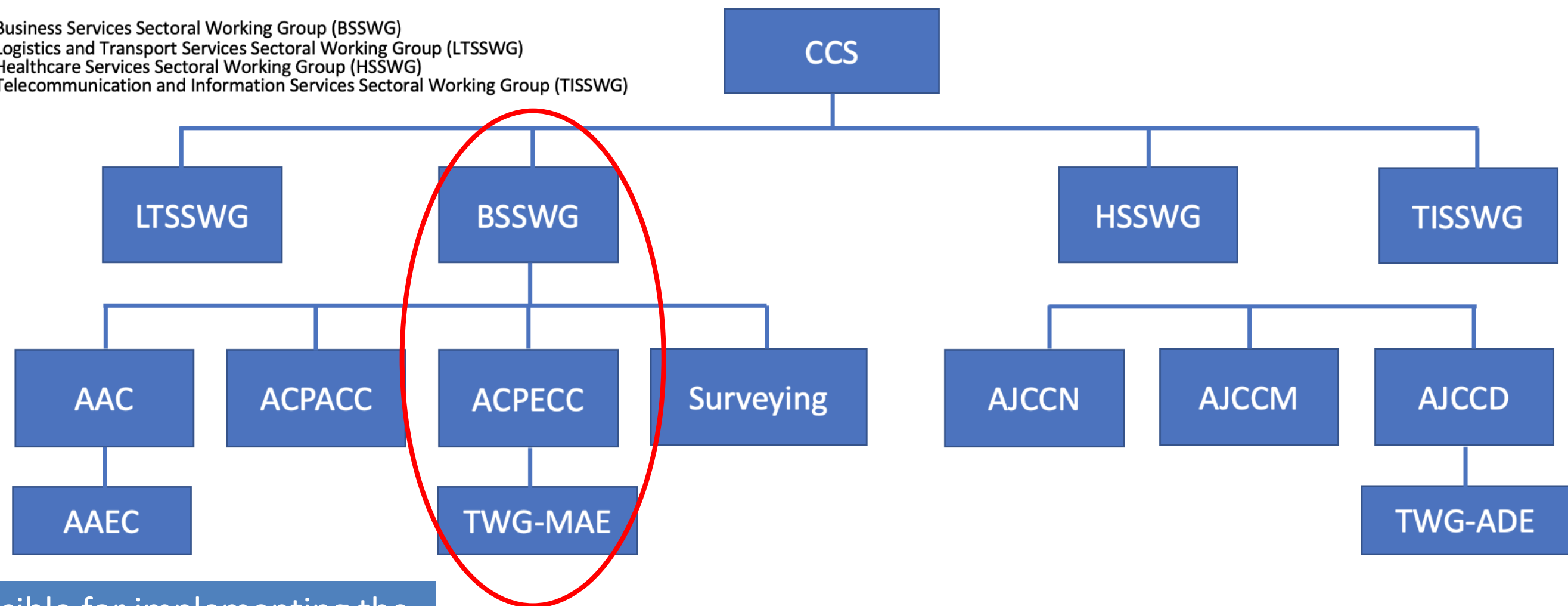
3. The Administrative Mechanism – the ASEAN Sectorial Bodies

3. The Administrative Mechanism – the ASEAN Sectorial Working Groups under CCS

- Business Services Sectoral Working Group (BSSWG)
- Logistics and Transport Services Sectoral Working Group (LTSSWG)
- Healthcare Services Sectoral Working Group (HSSWG)
- Telecommunication and Information Services Sectoral Working Group (TISSWG)



- ACPECC is responsible for implementing the MRA and facilitate mobility
- The authority to confer and withdraw the title ACPE (Registrar)
- Representation from each Monitoring Committee (MC) ASEAN Member State.
- Permanent Secretariat: INDONESIA
- Meets at least twice a year
- Next Meeting: October 2024

- AAC: ASEAN Architect Council
- AAEC: ASEAN Architect Education Committee
- ACPACC: ASEAN Chartered Professional Accountant Coordinating Committee
- ACPECC: ASEAN Chartered Professional Engineering Coordinating Committee

NAVIGATING THE ACPE REGISTRATION PROCESS

4. Applying for ACPE

- Apply online through BEM; open 24/7
- Basic Qualifications under MRA
 - Recognised education (engineering degree)
 - Gained a **minimum of seven years** practical experience since graduation
 - Completed at **least two years in responsible charge of significant engineering work**
- Additional qualification for Malaysia – **must be a PE**
- All applications are vetted by the ACPE Screening Committee
- Results forwarded to the Malaysian NMC for endorsement
- NMC recommends to ACPECC
- ACPECC evaluates recommendations and approve
- ASEAN Secretariat issues certificates
- BEM registers ACPEs

Major issues at Application Screening Stage

- CV (experience list) not updated
- List of only job scope is not acceptable
- Need a detailed list of significant engineering project or specific activities or research works
- With description of role and responsibilities
- Over a total period of at least two years

Obtaining approval at ACPECC is not all plain sailing

- Queries of degree
- Questions on relevant experience

Categories of Engineers varies between Member States

- Although there are common categories of Engineers e.g. Civil, Mechanical, Electrical, Chemical
- There are also differences and unique categories and qualifications e.g. Engineering Physics, Engineering Surveyor

- NO Fees
- Online application
- Open 24/7
- ACPE Screening Committee meets every month and submit to NMC
- Malaysia attends all ACPECC Meetings

5. Post-ACPE Registration – Professional Mobility through RFPE

RFPE Statistics as at 4 June 2024

- ACPEs interested to work in ASEAN Member States need to apply to be registered as Registered Foreign Professional Engineers (RFPE)
- Application is through respective Member State PRA (BEM in Malaysia).
- Must be in collaboration with local entity (sponsor)
- Local Laws and Regulations apply
- For Foreign ACPE to register as RFPE in Malaysia
 - No Fees for Registration
 - Fees only when employment starts
- For Malaysian ACPE to register as RFPE in ASEAN Member States, Fees are charge (about USD 100)
- Annual renewals

Summary and Conclusion

- The ASEAN MRA, ACPE Registration, RFPE are all instruments and facilities empowering Professional engineer to be mobile and tap into the ASEAN Community value chain and opportunities
- A systematic and formal structure to facilitate and encourage ASEAN Engineer's mobility is already in place and implemented:
 - The ASEAN MRA already nearly 20 years - Implemented by ACPECC
 - The RFPE registration system already in place in each ASEAN Member Country
- Now 7,645 ACPEs (Malaysia 3,334)
- But RFPEs only 30; Malaysians 9 (in Cambodia, Myanmar, Singapore)
- Continuous efforts to simplify applications e.g. online; regular meetings, forums; No fees; One time registration
- ACPECC TWG-MAE continue to develop initiatives to encourage mobility through its Committee and Sub-WGs.
- Navigating through the ACPE registration process can be tedious; time consuming; May need reviewing
